#### Natural Resources Conservation Youth Workshop

High school students with an interest in our natural resources will have an opportunity to participate in the 2000 Natural Resources Conservation Workshop. June 18-23 at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College. The Youth Camp is open to Georgia high school students ages 15 through 18 who have not graduated from high school at the time of the Workshop, or who have not previously attended the Workshop. Over 10,000 students have graduated and this is a unique opportunity for our youth to learn about natural resources.

The main objective of the workshop is to give students an opportunity to learn about Georgia's natural resources soil, water, air, minerals, plants, and animals. camp utilizes classroom and field trip activities to help interested young people learn the basic principles of the wise use of our natural resources. Students attending will also get a taste of college life while spending an entire week on the college campus. Students will be able to gain insight into careers through their counselors and instructors consisting professional personnel from the Department of Natural Resources, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, Georgia Forestry Commission and private industry.

On the final day of the workshop, students will compete for over \$5,000 dollars in college scholarships and cash prizes based on test scores from the week's activities.

## HEAVY USE AREA PROTECTION

The fall of 1992 saw the introduction of a completely new conservation practice for Hall County farmers. The first heavy use area in Northeast Georgia was installed at S & S Dairy Farm. Heavy use area protection became a simple solution to a complex problem. Installing a geo-textile fabric over a firm soil foundation and then compacting 6" of GAB (Graded Aggregate Base), immediately got livestock out of the muck and mud. It also made farmers' access to concentrated feeding,

watering, and loafing areas during winter rains much easier. Finally, it helps turn a waste product into a valuable resource. Some Hall county farmers are now selling the waste they scrape from their Heavy Use Areas. The waste that used to be ground into the subsoil by livestock and farmers' equipment is now becoming a valued soil amendment by the area's gardeners and landscapers. In 8 years heavy use area protection has progressed from a new idea to one of the most commonly used and effective conservation practices for Hall County's farmers.
